It is important that this grant is used effectively and based on school need. The <u>Education Inspection Framework</u> (Ofsted 2019 p64) makes clear there will be a focus on **'whether leaders and those responsible for governors all understand their respective roles and perform these in a way that enhances the effectiveness of the school'**.

Under the <u>Quality of Education criteria</u> (p41) inspectors consider the extent to which schools can articulate their curriculum (INTENT), construct their curriculum (IMPLEMENTATION) and demonstrate the outcomes which result (IMPACT).

- The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's budget should fund these.

This document will help you to review your provision and to report your spend. DfE encourages schools to use this template as an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.
