Prediction - part of inferring

can check your accuracy as you read

can find if you were right or wrong

Inference - more precise
reading between the lines
comes from you
filling in (in your head) what has not
been written on the page

- · How the character acts tells me...

Sometimes you will have to work out what is meant in a text. The technical term for this is inference, although it is also referred to as 'reading between the lines'. This is where you will need to look for what is suggested, rather than just what is being stated clearly or obviously. Detective skills are required.

Depending on what you are reading, you will find different things

inferred. It could be:

- ·a general fact or a precise piece of information
- *emotions and feelings
- ·the author's opinions or feelings

To infer successfully there are a number of things you should do.

For example:

- ·Look for clues or references in the text.
- •Think about the connotations of words used in the text.
- •Match something in the text to your own understanding, experience or knowledge.

Read this extract:

'In hoarse whispers they filled each other in on the day's events. Arthur's eyes widened at the news that Lucilla was planning to kill her uncle, and Finn's jaw tightened when he heard that Lucius intended to make Arthur fight in the amphitheatre.'

Now let's think about what we can infer...

What can we infer from the underlined phrases?

'In hoarse whispers they filled each other in on the day's events. Arthur's eyes widened at the news that Lucilla was planning to kill her uncle, and Finn's jaw tightened when he heard that Lucius intended to make Arthur fight in the amphitheatre.'

When I read that Arthur's eyes widened it makes me think that he was shocked by the news Finn shared. It is how we look when we are surprised too and that means he wasn't expecting this information.

hoarse - sounding rough and harsh
