There are two types of land features:
Physical and **human**.


A land feature is something that is part of the environment like trees, houses, parks, hills, roads, schools but there are split into two groups.

A **human feature** is **man-made** like roads, schools, houses and shops.

A **physical feature** is **natural** like trees, fields, mountains and rivers.

Which of these pictures represent *physical* features and which are *human* features?





Why is a dam *a human feature*?



A dam is *a human feature* because humans use dams to create reservoirs to store water that we use in our homes.

When dams are built they block a river and flood an area.

There are still physical features like trees but there are a lot less of these than buildings and roads!






Look at this map of the area around St. Ives in Cornwall
