


What is meant by 'Historical Enquiry'?

Historical inquiry is the process of “doing history”. It is a process that begins with the asking of historical questions. This is followed by finding and analysing primary and secondary historical sources. As historians, you then need to think about the reliability of the sources to establish fact.



L.O. I can pose questions about the past and enquire.

Any enquiry needs to begin with asking questions. The best place to start is to establish information about who, when and where questions.

'Who is the criminal?'

'When did the criminal commit the crime?'

'Where was the crime committed?'



When did they die?

When was our character alive?

Where did they live?

Who did our character commit a crime against?

The next step is to ask, "What happened?"
Try to work out the story of your character's
life, being accused of a crime and whether
they were found guilty or innocent.

happened?" kind of questions?
