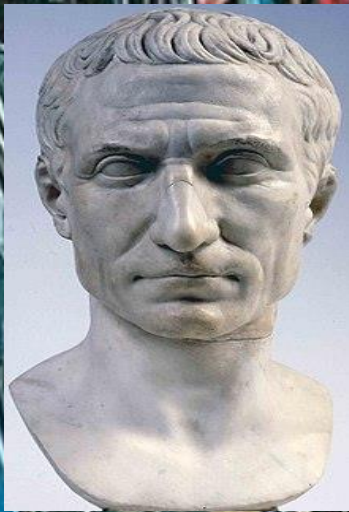

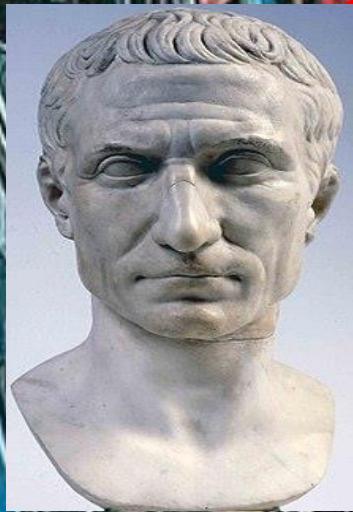
Thinking about everything you have learnt about Ancient Rome so far.

Where did the Romans leave from, go through and end up when Julius Caesar reigned?





Caesar made at least two attempts to conquer Britain before the Romans finally succeeded in 43 AD.

One journey was to *Gaul* where he found the *French and British* battling him together and eventually ended up sailing across the *English Channel* and *docked in Kent*.
