





The world wide web uses **search engines** to allow people to search for things on the web.

Search engines help you find websites on the world wide web.

The world wide web is a big place. If you know the web address of a site you can find it by typing it into the address bar along the top of your browser.

But what if you don't know the URL?

You can find pages by following links from other pages but usually it is easier to search for things using **a search engine**.

These are programs that search an index of the world wide web for keywords and display the results in order.

How do search engines order results?

Search engines sort results to show you the ones they think are the most useful.

PageRank is the best known algorithm which is used to improve web search results. In simple terms, PageRank is a popularity contest. The more links that point to a webpage, the more useful it will seem. This means it will appear higher up in the results.

The webpages on the first page of results are those that PageRank thinks are the best.

Search engines also pay attention to lots of other **'signals'** when working out the order to show you results. For example how often the page is updated and if it is from a trustworthy domain.

There are many search engines to choose from. Different search engines use different **algorithms**. This means that some sites will give their results in a different order, or they may even show completely different results altogether.

Why does it matter that the search engine orders results?

Why does it matter that the search engine orders results?

Usually the top links are the most relevant to your search most people only look at the first few results and rarely click on the second page of results.

Sometimes the top links are **adverts** for companies who have paid to be listed at the top so it is often worth scrolling down the page because you might find something better further down.

Finding things online

It is useful to think about the words that you use in your search. Too few and you will get too many results, too many and you may get no results at all.

When you want to find the answer to a question, such as, 'What was life like in the Stone Age?' You need to think about the important **keywords**.

You could just type the whole sentence into the search engine but it will probably ignore some words, like joining words and punctuation. Instead it might save time to search for keywords like 'life', 'Stone Age'.

Let's research our history topic using swiggle.
