What is a compound sentence?

What is a main clause?

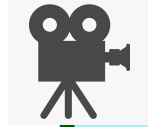
A simple sentence can also be called **a main clause**.

A main clause is a group of words that contains a verb and a subject which makes complete sense on its own.

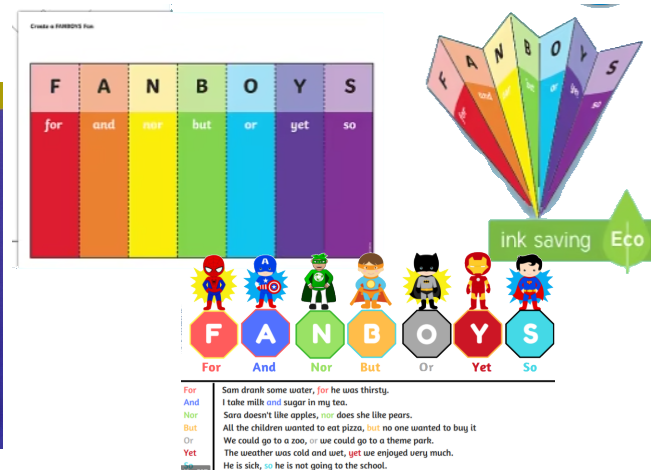
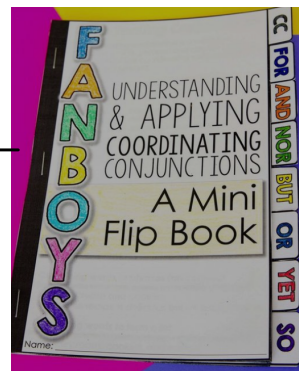
