How do we know so much about the life of Stonehenge? Well, even tiny fragments of cremated skeletons from the early times of Stonehenge give clues to archaeologists. Later, people started to be buried in graves with belongings such as pottery, arrows, stone tools and even some of the earliest metal objects. The 'Amesbury Archer' is one of the fascinating skeletons found nearby. Slowly but surely, all these discoveries build a picture of Stonehenge in all its phases.

Who was the Amesbury Archer?


In 2002, archaeologists at Amesbury, in Wiltshire made an amazing find. They discovered the grave of a Bronze Age man, just two miles from Stonehenge.

He was buried with around 100 objects! The people who buried him must have believed that he would use the objects in the next world.

When the man was found, he was nicknamed 'the Amesbury Archer'. This was because he was buried with arrowheads and wrist-guards used by archers.

In fact, the Amesbury Archer probably spent most of his time working with metal. One of the objects in his grave was a cushion stone - a tool used by metalworkers.

The Amesbury Archer was buried with rich possessions such as gold hair decorations, precious copper knives and flint arrows. These show he was a very important figure. Perhaps he was a leader, warrior or some sort of priest?



The Stonchenge Archer was a local man who lived about 4,300 years ago. He wore an archer's wrist guard but the only arrow archeologists found was the one stuck in his bones. It's possible that he may even have been a sacrifice.
