Simple Past Tense

We use **simple past tense** to refer to events that have already happened.

Howard Carter peered through the chamber.

Howard Carter entered Tutankhamen's chamber.

A witness saw the water-boy dash off to tell a worker what he had found.

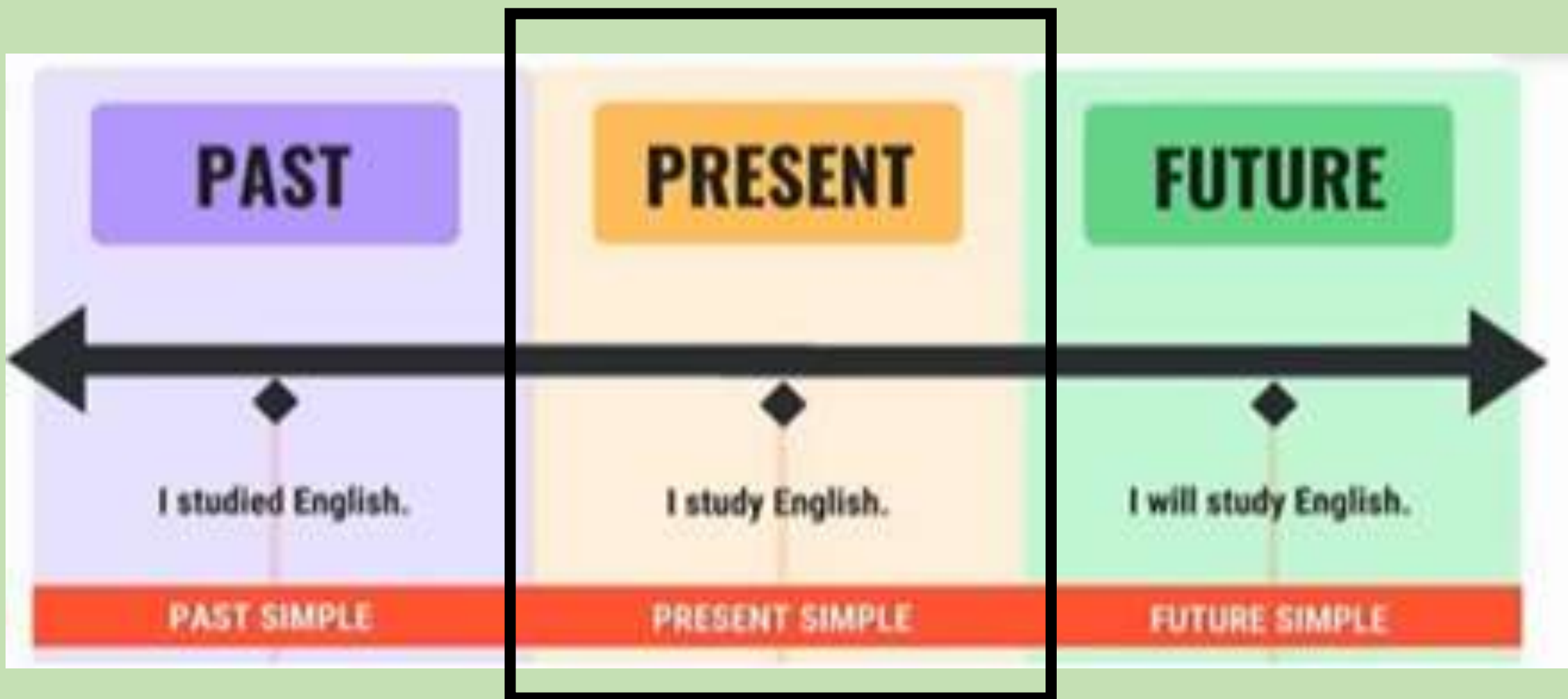

Simple Present Tense

We use **simple present tense** to refer to events happening now.

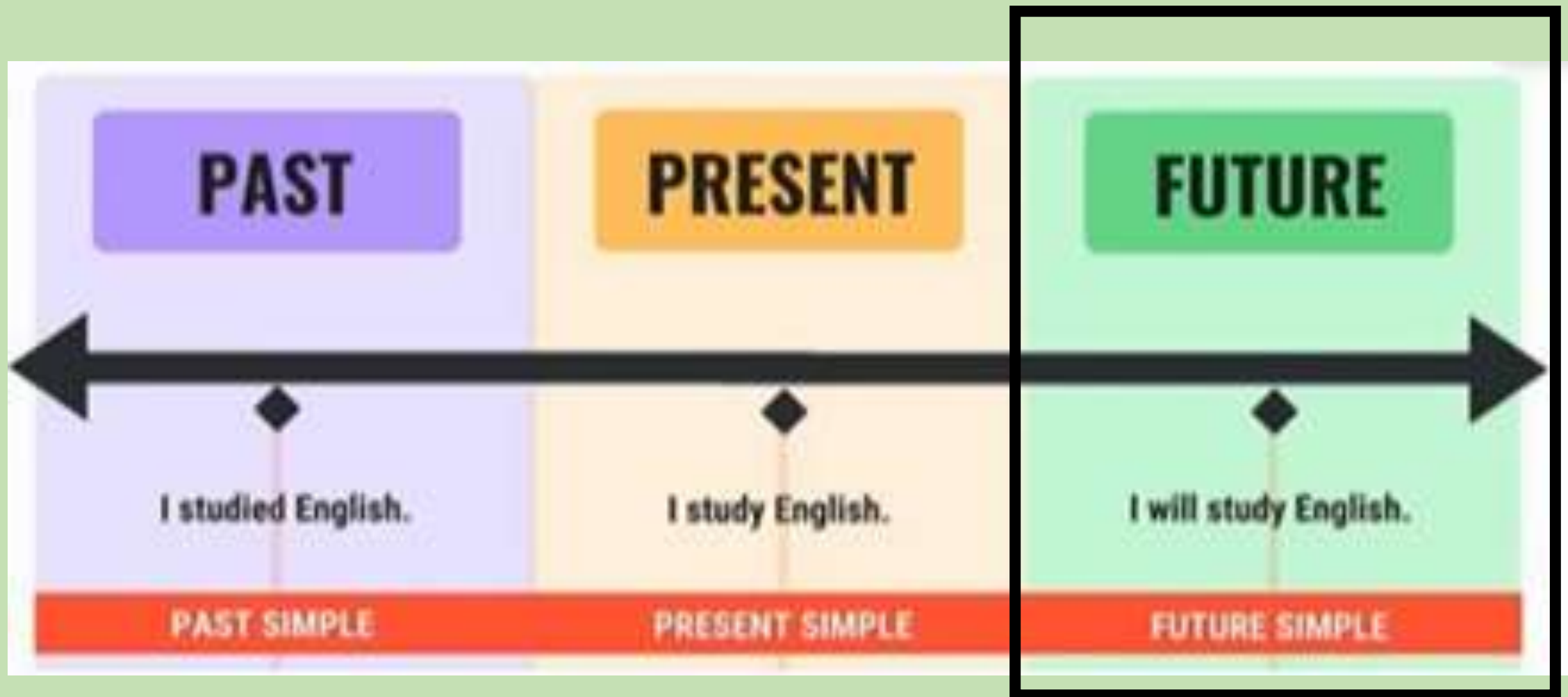
The water-boy **carries** water to the excavation site.

Howard Carter **is** 6ft tall with a thick, black moustache.

A witness **hears** raised voices of excitement.

Simple Future Tense

We use **simple future tense** to refer to events that will happen in the future.

The Egyptian Officials will **question** Howard Carter about his findings later today.

The Egyptian Officials will **ask** for witness statements.

Lord Carnarvon will **investigate** the tomb when he arrives from England.
